Question:

- 1. Is it permitted to connect the discharge piping from a water heater temperature and pressure relief valve with the discharge piping from another temperature and pressure or pressure only relief valve prior to draining to a floor drain?
- 2. If permitted, is it required to increase the size of the common piping at the connection of each additional temperature and pressure or pressure only relief valve discharge drain pipe?

Interpretation:

1. Yes

Article 7.6.1.7. does not address the connection of discharge piping from multiple temperature and pressure or pressure only relief valves to a common discharge piping system. However, that relief valve discharge piping must be in compliance with the requirements of Sentence 7.6.1.7.(5) & (7).

2. Yes

The common discharge piping must be increased in size to be at least equal to or greater than the sum of the cross-sectional areas and gallon per minute capacities of all connected relief valve discharge pipes. Appendix A-7.6.1.7.(5) indicates, where the discharge piping exceeds 2m developed length or has more than 2-90 degree elbows, the manufacturers instructions must be consulted to ensure the valve performance is not compromised.
