With respect to Sentences 7.6.1.3.(7) and 7.6.1.7.(9) of the BC Building Code:

- 1. Where should the shut-off valve or valves be located in each case?
- 2. Where should the vacuum relief valves be located in each case?

Interpretation:

The BCBC states:

- 7.6.1.3.(7) Every pipe that supplies a hot water tank shall be provided with a shut-off valve located close to the tank.
- 7.6.1.7.(9) A vacuum relief valve shall be installed when any tank may be subject to back-siphonage.
- Typical #1 The shut-off valve and vacuum relief should be installed on the cold water supply to the first tank. A separate relief valve is required on each tank.
- Typical #2 Each service water heater must have a separate shut-off and vacuum relief valve on each cold water inlet. A separate relief valve is required on each tank.

Additional Comments:

Tanks shown are side by side in the same room at the same elevation. While Sentence 7.6.1.3.(7) indicates a valve is necessary on the inlet of each tank, it is considered that due to the piping method, the valve on the inlet of the first tank serves both tanks.
