## Question:

Sentence 3.4.3.5.(4) permits both the handrail and any construction beneath the handrail to encroach 100 mm on both sides into the required width of a means of egress.

Does this mean that the walking surface of a stair tread, in a stair that is required to be 1100 mm wide, can be reduced to 900 mm wide in order to accommodate guards that are mounted on the exterior face of the stair stringers?

## Interpretation:


Yes

As shown on the attached drawing, as long as 900 mm clearance is maintained in a means of egress for the portion below the handrail height (i.e. 965 mm above the floor level), and 1100 mm clear width is maintained above the handrail height, the width of the means of egress can be considered to be 1100 mm for the purpose of calculation exit capacities.
