## **Questions:**

Is a detached garage serving a single dwelling unit required to have braced wall panels when it is less than  $55 \text{ m}^2$  in area and located in an area where the seismic design parameter  $S_{\text{max}}$  is greater than 1.2?

## Interpretation:

Yes.

Sentence 9.35.1.2.(1) states that the construction of a garage or carport which serves a single dwelling unit must comply with Part 9 except as provided by Section 9.35.

Sentence 9.35.3.1.(2) permits detached garages that serve a single dwelling unit and that are less than 55 m<sup>2</sup> in floor area to supported on mud sills or 100 mm thick concrete floor slabs.

9.23.13.10.(1)(a) and (3) waive the requirement for braces wall panels in detached garages serving a single dwelling unit when the walls do not support a floor and the seismic design parameter  $S_{\text{max}}$  is less than 1.2.

Section 9.35. does not provide any exceptions to waive the requirements for wall braces as described in Subsection 9.23.13. when the seismic design parameter S<sub>max</sub> is greater than 1.2, so based on Sentence 9.35.1.2.(1), braced wall panels are required.
