Question: 1. Must exit stair shafts be labelled with signage using letters rather than numbers (i.e. "Stair A" rather than "Stair 1") ? 2. Must exit stairs also meet the signage requirements of CSA B651-18?	
Interpretation: 1. Yes. Sentence 3.4.6.19.(2) states that " Upper case letters indicating the designation assigned to each exit stair shaft in both visual and tactile forms in accordance with Subsection 3.8.3. shall be mounted permanently on the wall on the stair side and on the floor side at the latch of doors to exit stair shafts". 2. Yes. Sentence 3.4.6.19.(2) requires that the design of the signage for exit stair shafts must comply with Subsection 3.8.3. Sentence 3.8.3.9.(1) requires visual information signs required by Subsections 3.4.5. and 3.4.6. and Article 3.8.2.10. shall comply with Clauses 4.5.1., 4.5.2., 4.5.3., and 4.5.4. of CSA B651-18. Sentence 3.8.3.9.(2) requires tactile information signs required by Subsections 3.4.5. and 3.4.6. shall have Braille and tactile characters in accordance with Clauses 4.5.6.2. and 4.5.6.3. of CSA B651-18.  <hr/> Patrick Shek, P.Eng., CP, FEC, Committee Chair
